PLANNING DEPARTMENT: SCHEDULE PUBLIC HEARING FOR ZONING MAP <u>AMENDMENT – DECEMBER 6, 2005 – RONNIE PROCTOR (636 BELWOOD-LAWNDALE</u> ROAD, LAWNDALE; RESIDENTIAL TO LIGHT INDUSTRIAL) (CASE 05-19)

<u>ACTION:</u> Mary Accor made the motion, seconded by Jerry Self, and unanimously adopted by the Board, *to schedule the public hearing as requested*.

EXTENSION & COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (ECA)

Commissioners Accor and Hutchins reported they attended the ECA Achievement Program on October 27, 2005. Greg Traywick, Cleveland County Extension Director, and Nancy Abasiekong, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension Agents, reviewed the history of ECA, which began in Cleveland County in 1914 as "Home Extension Clubs." They advised ECA is "one of the largest volunteer organizations in North Carolina" and there are currently seven clubs in Cleveland County: Belwood, Boiling Springs, Bread & Roses, Caring & Sharing, Ellie Jolly, Frances, and Lawndale.

The seven clubs have devoted a total of 8,258 volunteer hours to our county, and for the fourth consecutive year, have earned the Gold Seal award for North Carolina, having earned a total of 6,675 points.

Commissioners presented each club with a certificate of appreciation in recognition of their tireless work for Cleveland County.

FINAL PAVING ASSESSMENT: SHEREE LANE

Bill McCarter, Planning Director, reviewed that property owners along Sheree Lane have presented a petition requesting to participate in the paving assessment program. These property owners are requesting to be assessed at an "equal rate per lot" to pave this street in accordance with the North Carolina Department of Transportation (*NCDOT*) standards. The petition represents 79% of the lots and 79% of the road frontage, exceeding the minimum 75% required by NCGS 153A-205.

He said, "Seventeen area contractors were sent a request for proposal on September 13, 2005 to solicit bids on this project. Only one bid was received. The project was readvertised on September 26, 2005 and the following bids were received on October 21, 2005":

•	Custom Paving	\$143,615.00
•	Cleveland Contractors	\$147,592.00
•	Kennedy Concrete	\$149,500.00

Mr. McCarter advised that Cleveland Contractors was the only bidder who listed the use of minority contractors (an estimated \$30,000).

He explained there are 19 lots, and calculating by the low bid, each lot would be assessed at an estimated \$7,803.00, payable over five-years at 8% interest. The petition was submitted in 2003, but ownership of the property has remained the same as when submitted. He said the two corner lots and lots 17 and 20 did not sign the petition.

Chairman Hawkins opened the public hearing at 6:20 p.m. (Public notice of this hearing was conducted in accordance with NCGS 153A-191. Legal advertisements were published in <u>The Star</u> on October 21, 2005.)

Leonard Smith spoke against the assessment, stating "at this price I would just as soon live on a dirt road."

Bob Ramsey spoke in favor of the assessment.

Wendy Stinnette questioned if the NCDOT "ever accepts dirt roads under maintenance" and it was explained they do not accept dirt road, only roads that are paved to DOT standards. She also had questions as to how the paving would affect her property value. Chris Green, Tax Administrator, explained only the land value would be affected, as "values along that road are now assessed as dirt road."

Joe Hunt wondered if school buses would come down that road if paved, and was answered yes; and, he also asked if "speed bumps" were allowed and was told no.

Britt Barts had questions about utilities and was told the City of Shelby and the Cleveland County Sanitary District serve that area.

David Mathis said he owns three lots and asked questions about the "administrative cost" which is already factored into the stated cost.

Commissioner Self asked how the assessment would affect the property being sold and Mr. McCarter said "this would be the same as any other lien on the property."

Hearing no further comments, Chairman Hawkins declared the public hearing closed at 6:40 p.m.

<u>ACTION:</u> Johnny Hutchins made the motion, seconded by Jerry Self, and unanimously adopted by the Board, to adopt the following Final Assessment Resolution for the Paving of Sheree Lane.

Resolution 14-2005

ASSESSMENT RESOLUTION PAVING OF SHEREE LANE

WHEREAS, the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners have the authority to make special assessments for the purpose of paving streets as set forth and described in NCGS 153A-185; and

WHEREAS, property owners abutting Sheree Lane have presented a petition requesting the County of Cleveland, North Carolina, to assess said property owners for the purpose of paving; and

WHEREAS, the County of Cleveland shall access each lot abutting said street (formerly Rustic Lane) as shown on PB 15 Page 83, at an equal rate per lot, plus an administrative fee of one dollar (\$1.00) per linear foot, one hundred percent (100%) of the total project costs shall be assessed against each lot, and assessments may be financed at an annual interest rate of eight percent (8%) payable in annual installments and collected in the same manner as property taxes; and

WHEREAS, the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners held a public hearing at 6:00pm on Tuesday, November 1, 2005, in the Cleveland County Administrative Building, 311 East Marion Street, Shelby, North Carolina in accordance with the mandates of NCGS 153A-191.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners hereby agree to assess each property owner as set forth in this resolution.

ADOPTED THE 1ST DAY OF NOVEMBER, 2005

There was discussion of the question as to whether or not those who initially signed the petition were still in favor of the paving project and several property owners stated the assessment amount was higher than they had anticipated. The question was asked if a property owner could withdraw their name at this point in the process and Mr. Yelton stated he would have to research that question. Commissioner Hutchins stated he visited the road today and talked about how "rough" the condition of the road is and that he feels it has now become a "safety issue" as he had difficulty maneuvering the road in his truck. He expressed concern that fire and rescue vehicles would not be able to respond to calls. Vice-Chairman Self also noted the owners would recoup their investment if they sold the property, due to the increase in property value.

<u>ACTION:</u> Mary Accor made the motion, seconded by Jerry Self, and unanimously adopted by the Board, to award the paving bid to the low bidder of Custom Paving at \$143,615.00.

Mr. McCarter noted he has checked references for Custom Paving, who have completed many area contracts, and all references were "well pleased" with their work.

MINIMUM HOUSING CODE VIOLATIONS

Mr. McCarter stated, "We currently have 31 homes in the Light Oak community under violation of minimum housing code standards. To date, 10 of these homes have been demolished, and two are awaiting demolition." He said that one of the owners has agreed to demolish five of his units and repair one other, so the remaining 15 homes will need to be demolished by the county. He noted the Fire Marshal as stated the "fire college" will be held in Cleveland County in mid-November and will burn the houses as practice, reducing cost to the county.

Mr. McCarter expressed reservations over the demolition of the structures located at 1805 and 1809 Issac, stating that some renovations have been made, but he was advised by Building Inspection and the contractor who had been working on the homes, that construction had stopped. Mr. McCarter requested Commissioners table action on these two properties, allowing the owner the opportunity to complete the work.

He stated the community is "trying to clean up their community and make it crime free."

ACTION: Mary Accor made the motion, seconded by Jerry Self, and unanimously adopted by the

Board, to adopt the ordinances (copy found on Pages ______ of Minute Book _____)

authorizing the demolition of the dwellings as described by Mr. McCarter.
