Britt Bernhardt has applied for a text amendment to Section 12-138(a) of the Cleveland County UDO that would allow garages/carports to be placed in the front of a principal dwelling.

<u>PINNACLE SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER CONTRACT ADDENDUM</u>

Other than the addition of this language in section 25 of the contract, the contract is exactly the same as the one executed by the Board of Commissioners on November 6, 2018. <u>PUBLIC HEARINGS</u>

<u>RESOLUTION: N.C.G.S. 153A-76 & 153A-77(a) REGARDING CLEVELAND COUNTY BOARD OF SOCIAL</u> <u>SERVICES</u>

Chairman Allen called County Manager Brian Epley to the podium to present a resolution regarding the Cleveland County Board of Social Services. Social Services is the largest department in the County with 216 full time employees and provide services such as on-site client encounters and child protection investigations. The resolution under consideration for adoption is founded under North Carolina General Statue 150A-77 which was created in 2012 by the General Assembly. Originally, the statue only allowed counties to fully consolidate public health with social services to accomplish economies of scale. This was further ratified in 2015 to allow something other than full consolidation which is what the resolution being presented outlined. If approved, the resolution changes the current DSS Board to an advisory board and will be effective immediately. Mr. Epley explained there are several key reasons to transfer to an advisory board. The State of North Carolina, through the Secretary of Health and Human Services, has required the Board of County Commissioners, in all 100 counties, to participate in a state memorandum of understanding that outlines performance matrices in a variety of different programs that are required to be met by that department. Another reason is a potential regionalization. Also, recently there was an announcement state wide advising North Carolina will be moving to a managed care system. Staff feels transitioning the Social Services Board to an advisory board is more in line and better positions Cleveland County in a positive fashion. Forty-one counties in the state have already transitioned the Social Services Board to a different model than we currently have. Lastly, an advisory board is more in-line with traditional county operations. All the departments in Cleveland County across the organization share a reporting relationship as it relates to personnel, budget, etc. which creates a higher level of collaboration. This allows for better communication flow.

A goal staff has been working towards is substantial equivalency. Currently, DSS employees fall under the office of state personnel and transition them to true county employees who would operate under county systems. This step would further align Cleveland County to move forward with substantial equivalency. Post transition, if

approved, the Board will have the ability to maintain a DSS board structure with membership being an

appointment from the Board of County Commissioners. The DSS board would transition into an advisory board

like the Planning Board and would modify the Social Services Director reporting relationship to a more traditional

relationship that aligns with other county departments across the organization.

Chairman Allen opened the floor to the Board for comments or questions. Commissioner Hutchins inquired if the DSS Board transition would have any affect on the Health Department. Mr. Epley advised this would not have any effect on the Health Department. Commissioner Hutchins asked, if the County moved to substantial equivalency, would personnel that would be transferred over to county employees would receive the full benefits offered by the county. Mr. Epley explained those employees are already being paid by the County and are able to receive the benefit packages offered through county employment. The only thing changing is the criteria and job description that are derived from the State Office of Personnel. Commissioner Bridges questioned if there is any financial liability regarding the Social Services change. Mr. Epley responded no. There is no anticipation of different levels of liability or risk. From a financial stand point, it can only have positive impacts. A model that promotes team work and collaboration will allow progress to move forward.

Chairman Allen opened the Public Hearing at 6:21 pm for anyone wanting to speak for or against Resolution: N.C.G.S 153A-76 and 153A-77(a) regarding the Cleveland County Board of Social Services. (Legal Notice was published in the Shelby Star on Wednesday, November 14, 2018).

Mary Accor, 944 Dixon School Rd, Kings Mountain – is the current Chair of the DSS Board and wants to dispel some information and questions she received regarding the board transition. To be clear, based on the information shared from Cleveland County government to the DSS Board, the motion made by Commissioner Hutchins that brought about the public hearing for the DSS Board transition has absolutely nothing to do with the current DSS Board doing anything wrong or division between the DSS Board and County Commissioners. Rumors have a way of escalating when there are changes to current procedures.

Initially, I had concerns relating to timing and political motive. I also know from experience as a previous Commissioner, the option under House Bill 438 during a 2012 session, granted counties options for governing DSS. The recent state regulation put into place in the social services reform plan and the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for counties, as well as discussion of Medicaid transformation, caused great concerns due to possible penalties that are inclusive to state and/or federal funding being withheld due to a failure to satisfy the mandated performance requirements or failure to comply with the terms of the MOU. The current DSS Board, with Chairman Allen serving as the Commissioner Representative, has made conscious sound decisions in upholding the mission of providing the best possible care for Cleveland County's most vulnerable citizens. You, the Board, are now asking for the governing power to be transferred back to you with the ability to hire or fire the DSS Director, in which the current DSS board has not had the power to enforce. As we presently transition, we salute the competence of DSS Director Pritchard and wish her well in her retirement and thank all DSS employees for

their service. In regards to the details on how the original motion was made, we can only pray what is being done

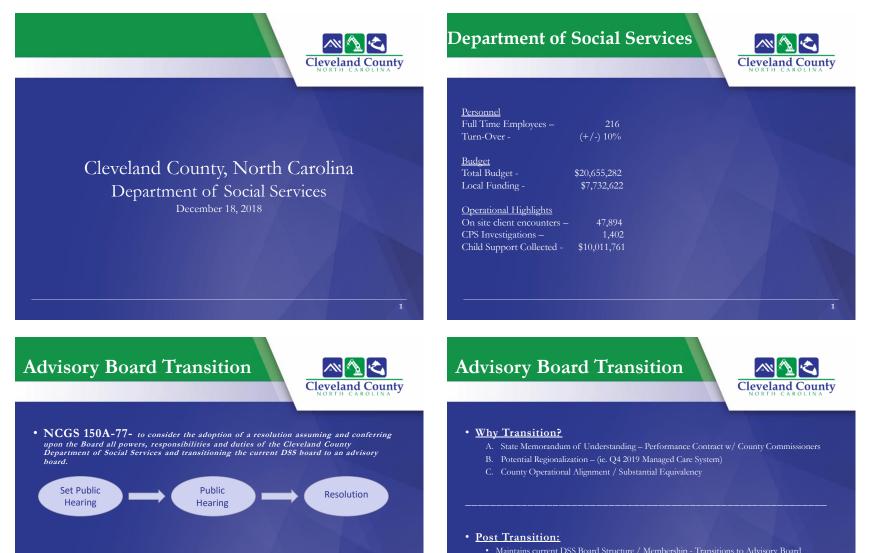
tonight is because each of you feel this is necessary to carry out new changes while continuing to provide quality

care for our citizens. My intent tonight is not to speak for or against what your ultimate decision may be because

you, as Commissioners, have been entrusted to make those decisions, but rather to communicate the competence of what your present DSS Board has done and will continue to do to bring about positive change. Our DSS Board members have been asked to continue to serve should an advisory board be forthcoming and each member has agreed to do so. Title of the board would be for change and not for the care, service or advocacy for the citizens in our county. Thank you to Chairman Allen and County Manager Brian Epley for your transparency and professionalism of meeting with the current DSS Board as individual, groups and departments to answer our concerns and questions prior to this public hearing. May God bless you the Board and the ultimate decision you will make that the services received be a positive impact in the lives of these children and adults receiving these valuable services will reap positive benefits on their behalf going forward.

Hearing no further comments, Chairman Allen closed the Public Hearing at 6:25 pm.

Chairman Allen opened the floor again to the Board for any questions or discussion. Commissioner Hutchins asked Chairman Allen her opinion and insight regarding transitioning DSS to an advisory board since she currently serves on the DSS board. Chairman Allen replied the board change will be good for the community and will hold the county more responsible and accountable in some areas. The changes will not affect the DSS department as far as the advisory board goes. She continued by stating the current DSS Board has done an excellent job and echoed Mrs. Accor's statements. The change will also allow for a more concise budget and employment regulation. Commissioner Hardin inquired for clarification, the transition would not affect any services or care received by county citizens. Chairman Allen stated that was correct.

CREATION OF DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES ADVISORY BOARD

Cleveland County Board of Commissioners

Chairman Allen again recognized County Manager Brian Epley to present an item regarding the creation of

the Department of Social Services Advisory Board. The Board of Commissioners has now assumed the powers and

duties of the county DSS board and Mr. Epley presented to the Board a resolution to create a DSS advisory board

to assist it in overseeing and managing DSS activities as outlined by N.C.G.S. § 153A-76 and N.C.G.S. § 153A-77(a). The advisory board will consist of seven members who would serve four-year staggered terms. The resolution also includes by-laws that would outline the operation of the meetings to include following "Robert's Rules of Order" and member titles. The initial term of the seven seats will include five positions being filled by the current DSS Board. The bylaws further allow the Board of Commissioners to appoint two more members to the advisory board. The advisory board will meet at the same place and time as the current DSS board. It will further have the power to amend its own bylaws as necessary, subject to the oversight of the Board of Commissioners.

CLEVELAND COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICES ADVISORY BOARD BYLAWS

I. DEFINITIONS

- "Advisory Board" refers to the Cleveland County Social Services Advisory Board.
- Board of Commissioners" refers to the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners.
- c. "Commissioner" refers to a member of the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners.
- d. "DSS" refers to the Cleveland County Department of Social Services.
- "Member" refers to a member of this Cleveland County Social Services Advisory Board.
- f. "County Clerk" refers to the person who occupies the role of Clerk to the Board of Commissioners as defined by N.C.G.S. § 153A-111.

II. MEMBERS

There shall be seven (7) members of the Advisory Board who shall be nominated by the Board of Commissioners. Members of the Advisory Board shall serve without compensation. Seats 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 shall be initially filled as provided for in Section III of these bylaws. Seats 6 and 7 shall be initially filled by the Board of Commissioners in any manner not inconsistent with Section III of these bylaws.

Seat 1 shall be occupied by a current member of the Board of Commissioners. Seats 2-7 may be filled by the Board of Commissioners in any manner not inconsistent with these bylaws.

In the event that the current Commissioner who serves on the Advisory Board is no longer able or willing to do so, the Board of Commissioners shall appoint another commissioner to occupy that seat. Should a vacancy arise on this Advisory Board in any seat other than Seat 1, the Board of Commissioners may appoint any person to fill the remainder of the term for the vacant seat.

III. TERMS

The terms of the initial members of the Advisory Board shall be as provided for in Section IV of these bylaws. Otherwise, members shall serve a term of four (4) years from

- The DSS Deputy Director shall make a reasonable effort to attend all meetings of the Advisory Board in order to support the DSS Director.
- v. The DSS Assistant Director of Plans and Operations shall make a reasonable effort to attend all meetings of the Advisory Board in order to support the DSS Director.
- vi. The Advisory Board Clerk shall be appointed by the DSS Director and shall attend all meetings of the Advisory Board or otherwise ensure that one of the other officers will carry out the duties of Advisory Board Clerk in his or her absence. The Advisory Board Clerk shall keep and provide access to minutes and agendas as provided in Section VI of these bylaws and shall generally ensure that the Advisory Board conducts its business in an orderly manner.

VI. MEETINGS

- Parliamentary Procedure: In all matters not otherwise inconsistent with these Bylaws, <u>Roberts Rules of Order</u> shall govern meetings of the Advisory Board.
- b. Regular Meetings: Will be held the last Monday of each month at 4 p.m. at the Cleveland County Department of Social Services. All meetings shall be noticed in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 143-318.12.
- c. Quorum: Shall consist of a simple majority of the authorized membership of the Advisory Board. However, the authorized membership of the Advisory Board shall not include vacant positions or members who are disqualified from voting.
- d. Telephonic Communication: Members may participate in regular and special meetings via telephone, video chat, or any similar form of constant and instantaneous communication. For the purposes of counting attendance, a member participating telephonically shall be counted as present.

the date of appointment. This four-year period shall be calculated in the manner prescribed by Rule 6(a) of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. Members can be reappointed at the end of a four-year term, and there is no limit on the number of terms that a person can serve.

IV. INITIAL MEMBERS

There shall be five (5) initial members of the Advisory Board whose terms shall be as follows:

V. OFFICERS

a. Officers Designated: The officers of the Advisory Board shall be a chair, vice-chair, DSS Director, DSS Deputy Director, DSS Assistant Director of Plans and Operations, and Advisory Board Clerk. Should there at any time not be a DSS Deputy Director or DSS Assistant Director of Plans and Operations, the DSS Director may appoint any DSS employee to serve as an officer of the Advisory Board instead.

b. Duties of Officers:

- i. The Chair is a member of the Advisory Board and shall preside at all regular and special meetings, delegate tasks to members, and see that all correspondence and business of the Advisory Board is carried out. The Chair shall act as spokesperson for the Advisory Board and perform such duties as shall be delegated to him or her by the Advisory Board.
- The Vice-Chair is a member of the Advisory Board and shall, in the absence of the Chair, have the authority and perform the duties of the Chair.
- iii. The DSS Director is the person who occupies the position of County Director of Social Services as described in N.C.G.S. § 108A-12. The DSS Director shall make a reasonable effort to attend all meetings of the Advisory Board in order to inform and advise the Advisory Board about the activities of DSS. The DSS Director shall further act as the executive officer of the Advisory Board and act as its secretary.

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- g. Vote: No member shall vote for, on behalf of, or in any way exercise the vote of another member.
- h. Closed Session: May be called in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 143-318.11.
- i. Special Meetings: May be called at any time by the Chair, or at the request of a simple majority of the authorized membership of the Advisory Board, or at the request of the Board of Commissioners. All meetings shall be called in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 143-318.12.

VII. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

No member of the Advisory Board shall vote on a question in which he or she has any personal or financial interest. The member shall declare that he or she has a conflict and shall not participate in the deliberations or be considered as a part of the necessary quorum. A question regarding whether a matter involves a conflict of interest shall be resolved by the Advisory Board.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended by a vote of the majority of the Board of Commissioners. The Advisory Board may submit a request for an amendment to these bylaws to the Board of Commissioners by majority vote.

IX. ADOPTION

These bylaws were adopted by the Board of Commissioners at its regular meeting on December 18, 2018.

- e. Minutes: Shall be kept for each meeting. Previous meeting minutes shall be emailed or mailed to Advisory Board members prior to the next regular meeting. Copies of minutes shall be provided to the County Clerk.
- Agenda: For forthcoming meetings, the agenda will be provided in time to allow members to prepare for those meetings. Copies of the agenda will be provided to the County Clerk.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

Chairman Allen called Scott Dadson, Executive Director for the Isothermal Planning and Development Commission (IPDC) to the podium to present the information on the creation of an Economic Development District (EDD). An Economic Development District (EDD) is a designation given by the US Economic Development Administration (EDA) to a region that has established a strategy-driven economic development plan for regional economic development. The regions are commonly comprised of multiple counties. There is usually a regional organization that serves to coordinate the locally-based, regionally driven economic development planning process (involving public, private, and non-profit sectors) to establish a regional strategic blueprint. This blueprint is known as the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS), and is designed to guide the economic prosperity and resiliency of a region. Regions that have completed their CEDS, and can show the support of its regional partners, and the state in which they exist, can apply to EDA to become a recognized EDD.

The IPDC Board recognized the need for a regional approach to economic development, and the opportunity for IPDC to serve as a regional convener and facilitator for its member constituencies. While each county in the Isothermal Region has dedicated staff working towards economic and business development, IPDC can serve as a conduit for Federal and State economic development programs that would assist and supplement each county's endeavors. IPDC worked closely with regional partners to utilize the USDA Stronger Economies Together (SET V) Program to develop the Isothermal Region is the last region in North Carolina to be designated as an EDD. Triangle J became an EDD in 2018. Once the Isothermal Region has been recognized as an EDD, it can access EDA programs and funding that would otherwise not be available to a region. Funding opportunities include Economic Development Assistance Programs, Regional Innovation Strategies, Planning and Technical Assistance and Disaster Recovery. EDA programs and funding can augment and supplement other federal funding mechanisms that IPDC already taps into, such as USDA, and the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC). This will greatly enhance IPDC's ability to promote and expand regional economic development projects across all four Isothermal counties.

Chairman Allen opened the floor to the Board for questions and comments. Commissioner Hutchins advised the

County is currently involved in Charlotte regional partnership. If the County decides to enter into this partnership,

how would that affect Cleveland County as far as operations? Mr. Dadson responded it will enhance the county's

current relationships with the surrounding regional partnerships. Cleveland County is in a positive position to be a

part of a larger regional operation with Mecklenburg County and as well as having a positive effect with the

regions to the west. There are several factors that join the east and west such as Highway 74, Isothermal Planning,

economic development and workforce development. Commissioner Hutchins questioned if the funds would follow

Cleveland County if they joined another partnership and would the county still be able to receive the funds

allocated through the Charlotte Regional Partnership? Mr. Dadson advised the EDD presented has nothing to do

with that relationship and therefore will not affect any funding. County Manager Brian Epley reiterated the funding answer. Commissioner Whetstine stated for clarification this will only enhance Cleveland County and not hinder any partnerships already in place. Mr. Dadson stated this was correct. Commissioner Hutchins asked the County Manager if this collaboration has been discussed with Economic Development (CCEDP) and if so, what direction did they give? Mr. Epley explained this has been reviewed with CCEDP and they are fully supportive and are excited about the additional resources.
