# Cleveland County Board of Commissioners December 12, 2023

The Cleveland County Board of Commissioners met on this date, at the hour of 6:00 p.m. in the Commission Chambers of the Cleveland County Administrative Offices.

#### CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Gordon called the meeting to order. Murphey's Toy Run Organizer Buffy Murphey led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance and provided the invocation.

Chairman Gordon announced: "The public hearing for SRI Three, LLC (Small Business Incentive Grant) has been postponed until further notice. The taxpayer has requested to postpone the public hearing due to a discovery bill the county made in October, and he has not paid yet. The Tax Assessor also found a typographical error on the discovery bill that needs to be corrected."

#### AGENDA ADOPTION

#### SPECIAL RECOGNITION

#### **MURPHEY'S ANNUAL TOY RUN**

Chairman Gordon called Murphy's Toy Run organizers John and Buffy Murphey to the podium to receive a proclamation of appreciation for their service to the community. Murphey's Toy Run was started in 1994 to help people in need during the holidays. The first toy run began with 8 motorcycles, taking toys to the Shriner's Children's Hospital in Greenville, South Carolina. Murphey's Toy Run has grown over the past 29 years, averaging over 500 motorcycle participants; toys are now delivered to the Shrine Hospital, Masonic Home for Children, Cleveland County Sheriff's Office, Kings Mountain Police Department, and various other places throughout the community. Commissioners presented the following proclamation:



#### SMALL PARK OF THE YEAR AWARD – BROAD RIVER CAMPGROUND

Chairman Gordon recognized one of the Broad River Campground developers, Tyler Watts, for speaking about the campground development and winning the national Small Park of the Year Award. The Board was reminded of the initial concept and groundbreaking of the Broad River Campground that occurred several years ago. The campground is now in the final phases of development. When completed, there will be 56 RV sites, ten cabins, five glamping domes, five campsites, a clubhouse, a pool, a splash pad, and a nature trail.

In November, team members from the Broad River Campground attended a national conference, Outdoor Hospitality Industry (OHI), open to campgrounds nationwide. The Broad River Campground was awarded the prestigious Small Park of the Year Award during the conference. Mr. Watts spoke of the hard work team members at the campground put in daily to make it successful. He thanked Commissioners for their continued support of the Broad River Campground. Commissioners congratulated Mr. Watts and his team for winning Small Park of the Year and thanked the team members for all they do for the campground and the community.

#### **SPECIAL PRESENTATION**

#### **CRISIS RESPONSE CANINES**

Commissioner Hardin called Robin Ledford, Jane Williams, and Jane Wood to the podium to present information regarding Crisis Response Canines. Crisis Response Canines (CRC) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that certifies, trains and deploys certified Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT) and Animal Assisted Crisis Response (AACR) teams. CRC's mission is to provide strength, comfort, and emotional support to individuals,

families, communities, and first responders experiencing intense traumatic emotions after critical incidents. CRC team members have various backgrounds, including law enforcement, military, health care, and education. This highly experienced team member complement affords a broad range of peer-to-peer support in virtually any situation. Canine handlers must participate in robust education and training to achieve and maintain certifications from FEMA's National Incident Command Structure Training and Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) principles. Several members completed the CISM certification of knowledge exam offered through the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, Department of Emergency Health Services, through its Professional and Continuing Education Program (PACE). Other required certifications include Pet First Aid, CPR, and specific courses associated with healthcare, and behavioral health. CRC canines also have extensive training and certifications, including National Therapy Dog Certification, AKC Canine Good Citizen, AKC Canine Good Citizen Advanced, AKC Canine Good Citizen Urban, Crisis Working Dog Certification, and Law Enforcement Defensive Systems Crisis Working Dog. Certification. Commissioners thanked and praised the work CRC does in the community and the country.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Robert Williams, 814 E. Stagecoach Trl, Lawndale – spoke about canceling the real estate purchase agreement on the consent agenda, agreeing with the Commissioners' decision to terminate the economic development project with Project Power. Mr. Williams then spoke against the Justice Center Change Order 4 on the regular agenda, advising by his calculations the project is over budget and will cost billions.

Steve Padgett, 215 Eagle Cove Drive, Cherryville – Small Business Development Director, spoke about the impact COVID-19 had on small businesses. Through continued support and tax incentives from the Commissioners, small businesses in the community have been able to rebuild and stay open for business. Mr. Padgett thanked the Board for their continued support of the Small Business Development Center.

#### TAX ADMINISTRATION: ABATEMENTS AND SUPPLEMENTS

#### TAX ADMINISTRATION: LATE APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTION/EXCLUSION/DEFERRAL

Per North Carolina General Statute §105-282.1, every owner of property claiming exemption or exclusion from property taxes under the provisions of this Subchapter has the burden of establishing that the property is entitled to it. Upon a showing of good cause by the applicant for failure to make a timely application, an application for exemption or exclusion filed after the statutory deadlines may be approved by the Department of Revenue, the Board of Equalization and Review, the Board of County Commissioners, or the governing body of a municipality, as appropriate. The Tax Assessor would have approved all of the applications if they had been filed on time.

# FINANCE DEPARTMENT: ELECTRONIC PAYMENTS AND PRE-AUDIT

North Carolina General Statute 159-28 requires counties to have an adopted resolution to engage in electronic payments. Staff recommends approving the resolution in Commissioners' packets authorizing the county to engage in electronic payments. The resolution approval will allow the continuance of electronic payments transacted with charge cards, credit cards, debit cards, gas cards, procurement cards, or electronic funds transfers. The electronic approval will also include an exemption from the pre-audit certificate requirements in North Carolina General Statute §159-28.

#### Resolution Authorizing Cleveland County to Engage in Electronic Payments

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Board of Commissioners that Cleveland County is authorized to engage in electronic payments as defined by North Carolina General Statute §159-28 or §115C-441; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the Finance Officer, to create a written policy outlining procedures for pre-auditing obligations that will be incurred by electronic payments as required by North Carolina Administrative Code 20 NCAC 03 .0409; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the Finance Officer to create a written policy outlining procedures for disbursing public funds by electronic transaction as required by North Carolina Administrative Code 20 NCAC 03 .0410;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners that:

Section 1. Authorizes Cleveland County to engage in electronic payments as defined by by North Carolina General Statute §159-28 or by North Carolina General Statute §115C-441; and

Section 2. Authorizes the Finance Officer to create a written policy outlining procedures for pre-auditing obligations that will be incurred by electronic payments as required by North Carolina Administrative Code 20 NCAC 03 .0409; and

Section 3. Authorizes the Finance Officer to create a written policy outlining procedures for disbursing public funds by electronic transaction as required by North Carolina Administrative Code 20 NCAC 03 .0410; and

Section 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

#### LEGAL DEPARTMENT: SALE OF COUNTY OWNED PROPERTY – PARCEL 26535

Parcel 26535, located on Carver Street, Shelby, was acquired by Cleveland County from foreclosure proceedings in 1990. Cleveland County became the last and highest bidder at Nine Hundred Twenty-Five and 00/100 Dollars (\$925.00). This parcel of land has no residential structures, and the current tax value is \$1,435. The county received an opening bid of \$1,000 from Bobby G. Hunt, II, to acquire parcel 26535. Staff recommend approval of the offer made on parcel 26535 and authorize county staff to advertise and open the upset bid process through resolution adoption.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners has set minimum qualifiers for bids on County-owned property to have a rational basis to the tax value and to seek final bids that cover the amount of the costs incurred, when reasonable; the bid on parcel 26535 is the sole bid(s) that covers the outstanding indebtedness on the property, but is under the current tax value of \$1,435.00.

WHEREAS, the sale of this parcel will generate future property tax revenue; and

THEREFORE, THE CLEVELAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RESOLVES THAT:

 The Board of Commissioners authorizes sale of the property described above through the upset bid procedure of N.C.G.S. § 160A-269.

- The County paralegal will notify the offeror of the Commissioners' authorization
  and the amount required of them for advertising costs to be paid by cash, money
  order or cashier's check to payable to the County and delivered to the County
  paralegal at 311 E. Marion Street, Suite 121, Shelby, North Carolina 28150.
- 3. Following receipt of payment of the advertising cost by the offeror, the Clerk to the Board will cause a notice of the proposed sale to be published. (In the event offeror declines prepayment of the advertising cost, the property will not be advertised.) The notice will contain a general description of the property, the amount and terms of the offer, and a notice that within ten (10) days any person may raise the bid by not less than ten percent (10%) of the first one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and five percent (5%) of the remainder.
- 4. Persons wishing to upset the offer that has been received shall submit a sealed bid with their offer to Christie Wooten, paralegal, Cleveland County Administrative Office Building, 311 E. Marion Street, Suite 121, Shelby, NC, 28150 for hand delivery or PO Box 1210 Shelby, NC 28151 for receipt of mail delivery on or before 3:00 p.m. on or before the 10th day following publication of said notice. Use of the mail or any means of delivery is at the bidder's risk and any bids received after the deadline will not be considered. Any bid with conditions or terms will not be accepted or considered. Use of the mail or any means of delivery is at the bidder's risk and any bids received after the deadline will not be considered. Any bid with conditions or terms will not be accepted or considered.
- 5. At 3:00 p.m. on said date (or the next following business date if the 10<sup>th</sup> day is a weekend or holiday), the County Attorney/Deputy County Attorney will open the bids, if any, and the highest such bid will become the new offer. If there is more than one bid in the highest amount, the first such bid received will become the new offer.
- If a qualifying higher bid is received, the County Clerk will cause a new notice of upset bid to be published and will continue to do so until a 10-day period has passed without any qualifying upset bid having been received.
- A qualifying higher bid must also be accompanied by a deposit in the amount of EITHER the higher of
  - (a) a minimum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00); or (b) five percent (5%) of the bid and accompanying One Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$125.00), or higher in the event of an increase,

for advertising costs. The greater amount of either (a) or (b) may be made in cash, money order, or cashier's check.

8. The County will apply the deposit of the final high bidder first to the costs of the bidding process, including but not limited to the cost of advertising the notice of the proposed sale, then the remaining balances to the purchase price at closing, unless the County withdraws the property from sale, at which time the deposit of the final high bidder will be returned. The County will also refund any deposit, excluding costs, made by bidders other than the final high bidder within two (2) weeks of the delivery of the deed to the final high bidder.

- 9. The terms of the final sale are that:
  - The Board of Commissioners must review and decide whether or not to approve the final high offer before the sale is closed, which it will do within thirty (30) days after the final upset bid period has passed,
  - The buyer must pay with cash, money order, or cashier's check at the time of closing, and
  - The County will transfer its interest in the property via quitclaim deed.
- 10. The County reserves the right to withdraw any property from sale at any time before the final high bid is accepted and the right to reject at any time any bids. In no event shall the costs of advertising any proposed sale or upset bid be returned to an offeror.

#### LEGAL DEPARTMENT: REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AGREEMENT CANCELATION

Cleveland County entered into a Real Estate Purchase Agreement effective August 17, 2023, with Project Sunrise. Both parties had, as a condition, precedent to their obligations under the purchase agreement, that the parties reach an agreement with respect to incentives from the county to the company. After negotiations with Project Sunrise, the county has not been able to agree with the company regarding incentives. The county sent a draft incentive agreement to the Company and its representatives on August 30, 2023. The company did not substantively respond to the incentive offer until October 2, 2023, at which time the company requested various changes, including a reduction in the anticipated amount of capital investment. The company also requested that another related company be allowed to join the incentive agreement and that the jobs it creates at the site be counted towards its job creation requirements under the incentive agreement. Legal recommends the cancellation of the real estate purchase agreement with Project Sunrise.

#### Resolution Regarding Incentive for Project Sunrise

WHEREAS, Cleveland County entered into a Real Estate Purchase Agreement (the "PSA") with an effective date of August 17, 2023 with "Project Sunrise" (the "Company");

WHEREAS, the Company and the County were unable to complete negotiations regarding incentives prior to the execution of the PSA because, according to the Company, it needed to quickly complete the PSA to meet the requirements of a foreign jurisdiction so that the Company could seek financing;

WHEREAS, both the Company and the County had as a condition precedent to their obligations under the PSA that the parties agree on incentives to the Company;

WHEREAS, the County sent an incentive agreement to the Company on August 30, 2023;

WHEREAS, the Company did not substantively respond to the draft incentive agreement until October 2, 2023;

WHEREAS, the Company requested various changes in the October 2, 2023, e-mail, including a reduction in the amount of required capital investment, and a few days later also requested that another, related company be included in the incentive agreement so that the Company could meet its job creation requirements; and

WHEREAS, several issues have arisen during the course of discussions with the Company that cause the County to question the organization, professionalism, and reliability of the Company.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF CLEVELAND COUNTY RESOLVES THAT:

- The Commissioners are unwilling to agree to the changes to the draft incentive agreement requested by the Company.
- The Commissioners do not believe that further discussions with the Company are in the best interests of the County or its citizens.
- The Commissioners do not believe based upon the course of dealings with the Company to date that any incentive given by the County to the Company will be likely "to increase the population, taxable property, agricultural industries, employment,

industrial output, or business prospects of the . . . county" as required by N.C. Gen. Stat. §158-7.1(a).

- The County Manager and County Attorney are hereby instructed to take such as action
  as is necessary to inform the Company that the parties have failed to reach an agreement
  upon incentives and that the County exercises its option to terminate the PSA.
- The County Manager and County Attorneys are instructed to take necessary action to terminate the PSA.

Highway 18 is considered an arterial road with the highway corridor protection overlay. Surrounding zoning districts include Rural Agriculture (RA) and Residential (R) to the east and south. The uses surrounding the property are mixed, including residential uses, two convenience/gas stations, an auto repair shop, and car sales. The Land Use Plan designates this area as Secondary Growth.
