Animal Services

Animal Services is a full-service animal shelter. They provide shelter for lost, abandoned, or unwanted pets, field services for residents needing assistance with situations involving violations of animal ordinances, assistance to pet owners related to rehoming their own pets, and assistance to residents with pets by making resources available to keep the pet in the home.

Anyone over 18 years of age is able to volunteer at the shelter. The program was temporarily suspended during COVID and will likely resume in the coming months.



On-going adoption promotions:

Pets for Patriots - Fee waived adoption for retired and active military veterans

Special Needs Pets - Fee waived adoption for pets with special needs

Seniors for Seniors - Fee waived adoption for residents older than 60 adopting a dog or cat eight years or older.

Two for One - Cats prefer company. Adopt one cat get the second at no charge.



If you are interested in adopting a furry friend, consider choosing one of the many cats or dogs at the animal shelter. Adoption fees for cats are normally \$20 and \$40 for dogs and include spay/neuter, vaccinations, flea/tick treatment, deworming, microchip, and a rabies license. There is no adoption fee for working cats (barn cats).

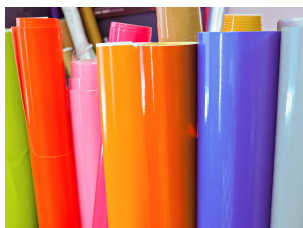

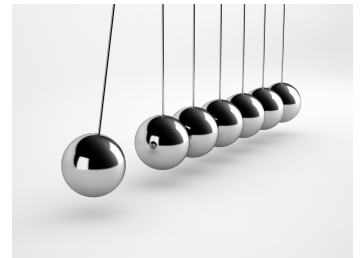

A New Chapter for Barbara

Recently, we said goodbye to a long-time library staff member, Barbara Blackburn, as she goes into retirement. You may know her as the writer of *Barbara Recommends*, and she has been ordering books for the library for multiple decades.

However, when she started here in 1988 after answering an ad in the paper, she worked at the front desk. "We had the card catalog then and were just switching to computers." She remembers when there was one public computer for library customers to use-- one that ran on dial-up.

Technology was one of the major changes Barbara has watched over her years at the library. The staff had to learn how to use the computers, while having the card catalog as a back up. She described it as an ever-evolving part of the library.

"The library has been an anchor for me through hard times in my life."

She was also at the library when the addition was built, and she recalled the process of packing the books into boxes

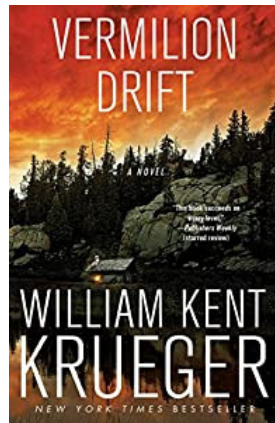
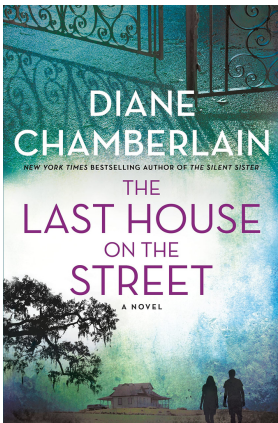


Between 1994 and 2021, Barbara read 2742 books, and kept a record of them all.

and sending them off to library customers who volunteered to "babysit" the books. "I remember going home with sore arms and sore thumbs from pulling all those books off the shelves." But the library has always been a special place for her. Barbara is a lifelong lover of books and reading, and her favorite part of the job is talking with customers about the books, so much so that she keeps a binder of her favorites so she can remember all the titles.

A New Chapter for Barbara

Some of the books she has read recently include **The Last House on the Street** by Diane Chamberlain and **Vermilion Drift** by William Kent Krueger.



Barbara has had many interesting adventures in her life. She and her husband spent two years living in Palau, Micronesia, and "took the long way home." This long way home lasted about five months, traveling across Asia, the Middle East, and Europe, before arriving home in 1968. Since then, she has gone on approximately

15 Road Scholar Trips and saw Earl Scruggs perform twice in Shelby. She is looking forward to some long-delayed trips in her retirement.

She enjoys early morning walks and plans to do a lot of exploring on the greenways and trails. She is also excited to spend some time with family, and of course, make frequent trips to the library.

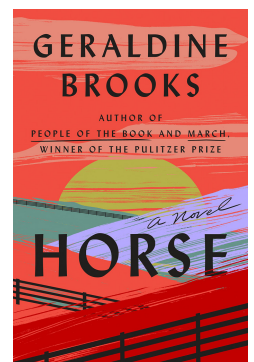
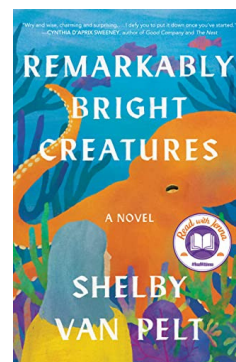
Debbie Recommends...

Whether you are relaxing at the beach or in a lounge chair on your porch, your summer reading will be more enjoyable with one of these beach reads in your hand: **Homewreckers** by Mary Kay Andrews, **Hotel Nantucket** by Elin Hilderbrand, **The Summer Place** by Jennifer Weiner, and **Meant To Be** by Emily Giffin.



The theme for the 2022 Summer Reading is “Oceans of Possibilities”. **Remarkably Bright Creatures** by Shelby Van Pelt is a perfect read for this summer. After Tova Sullivan’s husband died, she began working the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, mopping floors and tidying up. Keeping busy has always helped her cope, which she’s been doing since her

eighteen-year-old son, Erik, mysteriously vanished on a boat in Puget Sound over thirty years ago. Tova becomes acquainted with curmudgeonly Marcellus, a giant Pacific octopus living at the aquarium. Marcellus knows more than anyone can imagine but wouldn’t dream of lifting one of his eight arms for his human captors—until he forms a remarkable friendship with Tova. Ever the detective, Marcellus deduces what happened the night Tova’s son disappeared. And now Marcellus must use every trick his old invertebrate body can muster to unearth the truth for her before it’s too late. Shelby Van Pelt’s debut novel is a gentle reminder that sometimes taking a hard look at the past can help uncover a future that once felt impossible. Fans of **A Man Called Ove** will probably enjoy this book.



Pulitzer winner Geraldine Brooks’s **Horse** is fascinating saga based on the true story of a famous 19th-century racehorse. In 2019, Theo Northam, a Black graduate student in Washington, D.C., finds a discarded equestrian painting that he decides to research for a Smithsonian magazine article. Meanwhile, Jess, a bone specialist at the Smithsonian, gets a call about an old horse skeleton that’s been stored in the

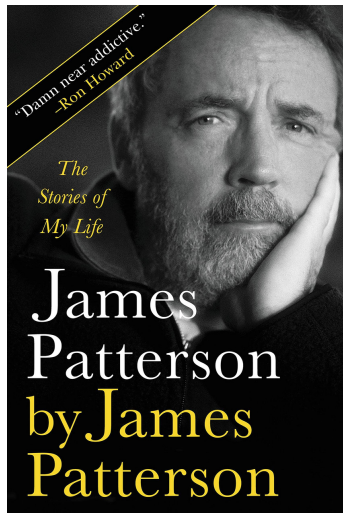

museum's attic. Jess and Theo end up meeting, but first Brooks takes the story to 1850s Lexington, Ky., where Jarret Lewis, an enslaved boy, is the groom for a promising colt that his father, Harry, a freedman, has trained. But then the horse, Lexington, is sold and the new buyer sends him along with Jarret to a Mississippi plantation with ruinous consequences. In 1853, Lexington and Jarret end up in New Orleans, where the horse thrills the racing world, and Jarret hopes to buy his freedom, while back in contemporary D.C., a romance blossoms between Jess and Theo.

Upcoming nonfiction titles include **James Patterson: The Stories of my Life.** Patterson's book is a blend of personal asides, fan trivia, and hot takes. The dozens of sections

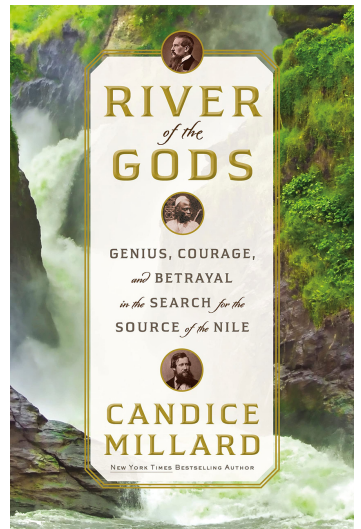
skim the major stages of Patterson's life, including his childhood in Newburgh, N.Y., his early love of reading, his aspirations to become a writer, his time in the advertising industry (where he claims to have coined the slogan "I'm a Toys 'R' Us Kid"), and his astonishing commercial success as a



novelist. As Patterson makes crystal clear, readers in search of a straightforward and detailed autobiography won't find it here but they'll get the lowdown on his first kiss (name, Veronica Tabasco), insights into his craft, and colorful accounts of the many celebrities he's crossed paths with.

For readers intrigued by books about exploration, **River of the Gods: Genius, Courage, and Betrayal in the Search for the Source of the Nile** by Candice Millard may be an option.

This is a stirring story of one of the great feats of exploration of all time, and its complicated legacy. Here, Candice Millard has written another peerless story of courage and adventure, set against the backdrop of the race to exploit Africa by the colonial powers

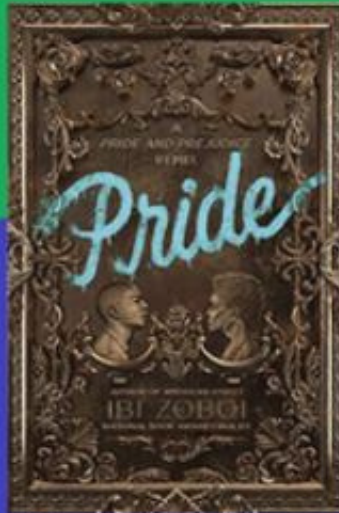

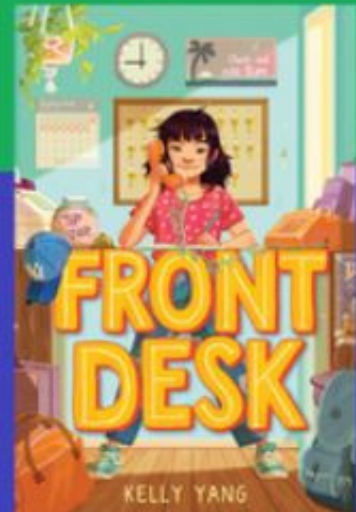
