2020 - 2021: A NEW BEGINNING

We started 2020 amidst the concern that many public facilities would be closed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. While the Cleveland County Library closed in late March 2020, and reopened in May, of 2020, and we had to reduce our operating hours due to reduced capacity, we continued to provide the same level of exceptional customer service we had in 2019, and the forty eight years of service prior to 2019.

The retirements of the Library Director, Carol Wilson, in September 2020, and the Assistant Director, JoAnne Owens, in November 2020, presented a change in leadership the library had not experienced in thirty-five years. With the appointment of Wright Adams as the new Library Director in October 2020, the library was positioned to enter 2021 with a new administrative team in place.

In the Winter of 2021, the library's new administrative team (LAT) composed of the Library Director, Technical Services Manager, Adult Services Manager, Youth Services Manager, Spangler Branch Manager, and the Outreach and Community Engagement Manager, began to implement a new service model, plan for new collaborative spaces, and innovative programs that would include the principles of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics (STEAM).

During the Spring and Summer of 2021, the library used the generous gift offered by Dr. Eugene Young to rededicate the Main Library in honor of his mother Eugenia H. Young, (below left) on Monday, May 3, 2021. In the Summer of 2021, the library began its partnerships with the Shelby City Park offering STEAM programs for Summer camp participants. The library also offered STEAM programs and weekly story times at the Ruby C. Hunt YMCA in Boiling Springs. The library renewed its partnerships with the Earl Scruggs Center, the Foothills Farmers' Market, and North Carolina Cooperative Extension to offer a variety of history and food science programs. In June of 2021, the library distributed the first issue of its new magazine the "Spark" which will provide information on upcoming programs and community partnerships.

In the Fall and Winter of 2021, the library plans to open the city of Shelby's first Makerspace (below center). The Makerspace will offer citizens the opportunity to use a 3D printer and participate in workforce development and entrepreneurship programming. The library, in partnership with NC Cleveland County Cooperative Extension, will offer a seed library at the Main Library, the Spangler Branch, and the Boiling Springs Library at the Ruby C. Hunt YMCA.

- We are a part of what attracts, grows and retains talent in Cleveland County, building partnerships with welcoming, vibrant community groups


CHILDREN'S BOOKS DELIVERED


From 2019 to June 2021 318 storytimes were held when delivering books to Children's Outreach Centers.

Expanding and diversifying our collection to meet the needs of our growing community.


OBJECTIVES

- 3.Offer relevant state and local materials in the North Carolina Collection, a special collection of social, natural, and cultural resources for the state of North Carolina and Cleveland County.
- 4.Enhance our Youth Services collection (including Children's Outreach, Young Adult materials at the Main Library and the Spangler branch).

OUTCOMES

- Regardless of a person's circumstance, neighborhood or background, the library is an accessible and supportive community anchor.
- We are part of an ecosystem of service providers and advocates for marginalized and underserved communities, eliminating barriers and strengthening support for those who need us most.

In 2019, 150,134 items were circulated. In 2020, you checked out 131,089 items. From January 2021 to June 2021, you borrowed 73,835 items.


