





Bill Clinton and James Patterson have teamed up to write their second fast-paced thriller, The President's Daughter.




Great Circle by Maggie Shipstead is the epic tale of a female aviator. Marian and her twin are sent to live in Montana in 1914 after their mother dies when they are infants. Barn stormers inspire young Marian and later she becomes a bush pilot in Alaska. In WWII she

ferries Spitfires and in 1949 begins a pole-to-pole circumnavigation of the globe which ends in a crash in Antarctica. In a present-day narrative, film star Hadley who was orphaned by a plane crash is cast to portray Marian, a big change from her previous fantasy movie roles. This new novel promises history and adventure as these women push the boundaries inscribed around them.

Andy Weir's **Project Hail Mary** gives the reader a sun that is rapidly dying, meaning humanity will be wiped out within decades.






Survival of the species depends on a lone astronaut who is far from home. Weir, the author of **Martian**, shows that he is a star in the mainstream science fiction world.

If you watched the recent Ken Burns miniseries on Ernest Hemingway, learn more about the interesting women Hemingway married with an historical novel.

The Paris Wife by Paula McLain gives a vivid picture of Hadley Richardson, his first wife. The journalist Martha Gelhorn is portrayed in Love and Ruin, also by Paula McLain. Read Mrs.

Hemingway by Naomi Wood for a portrait of all four wives.










Nonfiction readers will anticipate reading Facing the Mountain: A True Story of Japanese American Heroes in World War II by Daniel James Brown, author of the best-selling Boys in the Boat. His new

book draws on his research and interviews about the Japanese American internment and focuses on four families with sons who volunteered to serve in the American military and their struggles with racism and equality. Brown describes the training and combat record of the all-Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team. and their bravery despite enormous casualties. Brown illuminates an important part of American history in his compelling style.



MacArthur fellow Tiua Miles examines a cloth sack displayed in the Smithsonian Museum of African American History. In 1852 an enslaved woman named Rose packed this sack for her nine-uear-old daughter Ashley who

was being sold to a new master in South Carolina. Rose included a tattered dress, three handfuls of pecans and a braid of her own hair. Later in 1921 Ashley's granddaughter embroidered Rose's wish that "It be filled with my love always," on the sack. Historian Miles uses South Carolina plantation records and more to craft this moving narrative. Look for All That She Carried: The Journey of

Ashley's Sack, a Black Family Keepsake.

After the year we have been through, folks are ready to say, "Come on over," to their friends and neighbors. Elizabeth Heiskell adds to any get together with fun, fast, filling food with a Southern twist. Check out Come on Over! Southern Delicious for Every Day & Every Occasion.

History Highlight

SHELBY CITY PARK CAROUSEL DONNA BRIDGES AND KALLEN TERRY

Summer in Shelby is a wonderful time to get outside and enjoy the sunshine, but things normally kick off in April at the Shelby City Park. With the beginning of April, the Shelby City Park typically sees the opening of many of its attractions: the Miniature Train, the All Aboard Playground, and its most beautiful point of attraction, the Carousel.



The \$6500 item was a gift given to the park and citizens of Shelby by the First National Bank of Shelby, NC, and Union Trust. The 1919 Herschell-Spillman Company item was brought from Florida to Shelby and is considered one of our greatest gifts. The Carousel began its operation at the Shelby City Park in the 1950s and operated for about 30 years.

In the 1980s, Tommy Forney and Brenda Lowery started restoration of the two chariots and 36 wooden horses as part of the American Folk Art Restoration. Only 32 of the horses were restored and many of the moving parts were hand painted. Music from the 1923 Artizan Wurlitzer Military Band organ has delighted many on this attraction.

The Annual Foothills Merry Go Round Festival brings in huge crowds from Cleveland County and the surrounding area in late April. People come from all over to see the restoration of this antique, celebrating the unique environment and heritage with preservation in mind.

Although the festival was cancelled in 2020, explore our beautiful City Park and the outdoor experiences they offer. A perfect place for family and friends to safely gather outdoors, in the lovely town of Shelby.

Making Our Community Better

Cleveland County's drive to make our community better has never been more important than since the Covid-19 Pandemic forced many businesses to close their doors, schools to operate remotely, and all residents of Cleveland County, North Carolina, the country, and the world, to change our approach to every day life, and start to embrace what might be a new normal. Since March 2020, Cleveland County Government's dynamic leadership and its **ReAct, ReBuild, ReThink** initiative to making local government more responsive to the needs of its residents, the county was able to redeploy its resources through the hard work and dedication of all of its departments.

The Cleveland County Health department continued to remain agile during the pandemic by working with the state and federal government to offer drive thru vaccination clinics in early 2021. This was in addition to the Health Department's School Health Team planning to offer drive-thru Tetanus, Diptheria, Pertussis (Tdap) and

Meningococcal (MCV) drive-thru vaccine clinics for rising 7th to 12th graders in mid-May 2021. The Health Department will begin offering Covid-19 vaccines in the Adult Health clinic and to Cleveland County High School students with parental consent.

The County Managers office worked with all county departments and with the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners to create a budget that will allow the county to enter the final phase of the ReAct, ReBuild, ReThink initiative. ReThinking High Performance, will allow the county to continue to provide a high level of services to the residents of Cleveland County. Originally, the trust to rename the library was written into Eugene Young's will, but this was changed so he could enjoy the library with her name on it while he is still alive.

Eugenia never had a formal education, but she strongly believed in the importance of public education and she felt that the library played an important role in providing educational materials and community resources to all Cleveland County residents. She was known for her frequent library visits and her love of reading.
