## Letter from the Director

During the Fall and Winter of 2022-2023, the library is planning for a return of bookmobile service to parts of upper and lower Cleveland County. Some towns which had not previously received bookmobile services that are not close to a physical library branch location, will be able to check-out and return items at a location close to their homes. The Friends of the library fundraising campaign to help raise money to purchase the bookmobile and outfit the bookmobile with technology that will truly make the bookmobile a "mobile library" is ongoing through the Spring and Summer of 2023. Rolling for Reading will enable the library to offer workforce mobile development programming and Makerspace programs to rural parts of upper and lower Cleveland County. The mobile library is projected to begin in the Fall and Winter of 2023.

During the Winter of 2023, the library will offer some new initiatives to increase literacy for children and adults. Reading for Fines, which will begin in January 2023, and run through March of 2023, will provide an opportunity for customers to reduce their fines by reading. Customers can have their outstanding balances reduced by twenty dollars by participating in the Reading for Fines program during the Winter for 2023.

With the opening of the library system's first teen space in late Fall, early Winter of 2022 - 2023, the library will now expand on the offering of programs for tweens and teens in Cleveland County.

#### Board of Elections

The Cleveland County Board of Elections oversees all elections in Cleveland County including those for the fifteen municipalities in the county. The Board operates under the general supervision of the State Board of Elections, has quasi-judicial and policy making authority over all aspects of elections and voter registration in Cleveland County.

The principal functions of the office include voter registration, candidate filing, establishing election precincts and voting sites, appointing and training precinct officials, preparing and distributing ballots, maintaining voting equipment, canvassing and certifying the ballots cast in Cleveland County, candidate campaign finance compliance and providing public information on elections and voting procedures.

The upcoming November 8, 2022 General Election will see 170 hours of voting for Cleveland County residents. This requires the Board to recruit and train 300 employees to fully staff three early voting locations and 21 election day polling sites.

Early voting will begin on Thursday, October 20, at the H. Lawrence Patrick Senior Center 909 E. King St Kings Mountain, NC 28086, the Eugenia H. Young Memorial Library 104 Howie Dr. Shelby, NC 28150, and the Boiling Springs Town Hall 114 East College Ave Shelby, NC 28152, from 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Monday - Friday, and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday October 29, and Sunday, October 30, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.






